If you thought your treasured car was the product of careful planning, co-operation between company owners and dedicated engineers, stylists etc, and skilled assembly by loyal workers, think again! After you read the book you may be embarrassed to again show your car in public!

In many cases, from the dawn of car production to the present day, megalomaniac company owners were ready to stab anyone in the back who didn't agree with them, and many cars were (and still are) built with significant faults (but I was pleased to see the good words the author had written about the Triumph 2000 and its designers, and the BMC 1100/1300 cars!).

In Britain Bill Morris took one look at a prototype Morris Minor, said it looked like a poached egg and would have nothing to do with it, saying that the Morris Eight was good enough for post-war Britain. He didn't speak to designer Alec Issigonis for another decade.

### VCC National Motor Cycle Rally 2019 by Dave Mayhew

2019 being 4 years since the Cromwell rally it was time to hold the VCC National Motor Cycle Rally in the South Island again and this time it was to be centred on Blenheim. I decided that I would share a trailer ride for my Douglas Dragonfly to the Wellington/Picton ferry with Martin and his BSA Gold Star and in preparation for the 100 kilometres of unsealed Molesworth Track I had fitted a new rear tyre and invested in a new pair of Teflon padded pants in case I happened to take a slide. The infamous Molesworth Track is a semi-private road that goes from Blenheim to Hamner Springs via the Molesworth Station (sheep, not trains). This was to be a challenge that I was looking forward to but unfortunately the track became closed as the fire risk was far too high.

On the way to Wellington we overnighted at Ohakune and were able to view Peter Thomsons' motorcycle museum at Rongotea, mostly Harley Davidsons and BMWs and four Douglas'. Whilst there we all had fun galloping around Peters paddock on an old motor cycle with oval wheels.

190 motor cycles had been registered from two 1911 Abingdon King Dicks up to a 1988 BMW. Only two Douglas' were registered but I was quite unable to locate the other one, Percy Ralston's 1915 2 3/4 hp. Old acquaintances were met and many new ones were made. Saturday dawned with brilliant sunshine again for the rally; I was wearing bib number 37 and my start time was to be at 10:01am. The competition part was just 111 miles on super smooth roads wending their way amongst the yellow hills of dry grass and up and down the gentle slopes. Such an enjoyable ride, but unfortunately I wasn't competitive enough to win a class prize. In the evening we were given a very interesting talk by an ex-motorcycle racer, Graeme Crosby.

The next day we all displayed our bikes at Omaka, close by Sir Peter Jacksons' museum of fighter aircraft from the First World War, and we performed competitive field events on our motorcycles.

Monday was the first day of a four day "hub type" tour and we rode to Nelson to view two private motorcycle collections. Many bikes in immaculate condition, lots of BMWs and so many makes that I had never heard of before; and I was quite surprised at just how many limited edition models there were including a Vincent Black Knight of which only 106 were made. I lunched in the Anchor Pub with a couple of other bikers then after lunch I chose the easy way back to Blenheim by myself, just 75 miles in beautiful sunshine knowing that a tail end Charlie with his trailer was only two or three hours behind me. Most of the gang chose the longer challenging route which proved to be too much of a challenge for some of them with miles and miles of fiercely corrugated road and one of them broke the axle of his side car, which was promptly discarded and his wife came home on the pillion.

On Tuesday the tour was to visit some local vineyards and wineries, but wine tasting not being one of my favourite pastimes I decided to have a rest day and just popped into town for a bit of shopping ; cleaned my bike and polished my boots.

Wednesday proved to be much more of an interesting day as we were to be transported along Queen Charlotte sound by water taxi barge. Divided into groups of about 10 each I found myself with the first group to board at 7:30am as dawn was breaking, only 20 miles away. This was to be a new experience for the bargee as he had never carted motor bikes before, and if he had to transport about 100 bikes on a 20 minute ride each time he would need to travel very fast, unfortunately we were all getting soaking wet by the spray until we dragged all of the bikes further back and crowded to the back was he able to travel at a necessary speed. Arriving at Torea Bay the short loading ramp was dropped into the water close to the beach like a wartime landing craft and we rode off amongst the pebbles and up a scruffy walking track to the road and soon after found a posh hotel, The Portage, and enjoyed a most welcome brunch. After the Portage we rode towards the end of the peninsula to view the incredible view over the Marlborough Sounds. By the time we got back and returned to Ohingaroa Bay for a barbecue lunch thanks to Marlborough branch. We had covered 32 miles of continuous winding road at about 20 mph; left then right; left then right; second gear all the way; such fun. We returned to Blenheim via Havelock covering just 95 miles for the day.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Sir, the term "classic" seems to crop up regularly in car club circles , particularly in relation to vehicles of a certain age, and to its possible use in a club's name.

My Oxford Compact Dictionary of 2000 ("compact" in that it has only 1348 pages..) defines classic as follows:

Adjective 1: Judged over a period of time to be of the highest quality. 2: Typical.

Noun 1: A work of art of established value.

- 2: (Classics): The study of ancient Greek and Latin literature, philosophy and history.
- 3: (The Classics): the works of ancient Greek and Latin writers.

Classical is defined as follows:

Adjective 1: Relating to ancient Greek or Latin literature, art or culture.

- 2: Representing an exemplary standard within a longestablished form of art or a language.

- 4: Relating to the first significant period of an area of study, eg classical Marxism.

My grandfather's Webster's Dictionary of 1929 has most of the above, plus: 1: Pure, 2: Refined, 3: Clear-cut.

Make all of that what you will! Oxford adjective 1 could apply only to very few cars, 2 to me seems rather vague but could be applied to a car of any period. Adjective 2 of classical and all of the Webster definitions could apply to my Triumph and Vanden Plas cars!

If I really had to use my interpretation of the term as it applies to cars I would say that the Morris Minor is definitely a classic, the spartan Standard Eight of 1954 (they even used an obsolete pre-war RAC horsepower rating in its name!) not so. To sum up: the term "classic" needs to be used very, very carefully!
