Chairman's Report - August/September 2021

What a challenging couple of months. Having got used to a certain level of freedoms again, and

being one of the lucky VCC branches to have a Swap Meet this year, we were plunged back into lockdown at the shortest of notice. I feel for Jenny Cole and all the hard work she put in to arranging the Spring Tour, only to have to pull the plug three weeks out. Since that decision was made, the whole of Northland were locked down, so things actually worsened. Large parts of the Waikato are now locked down, and of course Auckland and parts of King Country. It looks like it is creeping closer, with a confirmed case in the Bay of Plenty.

We did manage a club night in August, and a few days later I flew down to Christchurch to the VCC AGM which celebrated the VCC's 75th birthday. There was no vote on the new VCC logo, the management committee asked for the planned vote to be deferred. It had created a lot of polarising discussion prior to the AGM. It should be noted that after the closing of entries for the Festival of Historic Motoring in January, the number of entries had exceed the minimum of 400 required, so the event will go ahead, lockdowns permitting. Nothing is certain nowadays. It is not too late to enter, there will just be a higher entry fee payable.

The only other point of interest from the AGM I think needs consideration is the average age of VCC members. Less than 20% of members are under the age of 60. At the current rate of attrition versus new member growth, the VCC will slowly fizzle out. The endless "boardroom" rows over the logo, the name of the VCC etc, will do nothing to prevent this happening. Branches themselves have to take ownership of making themselves attractive to a wider range of people, who would then join. It was sad to see a pro-active attempt to improve a branch's image presented to the AGM was so roundly talked down. Those talking it down were clearly part of the 80%, and I really don't think they care about a future of the VCC they can't be

a part of. Doing what we do now has got us to this problematic age imbalance. Continuing to protect doing the same will accelerate the VCC's ultimate failure to exist. Maybe the management committee should ask branches to only send delegates under the age of 40 to the next VCC Executive meeting, and the Management Committee just listen, and let the younger group present steer things towards a future more compatible to a younger audience.

We had to cancel our September club run and club night, but a hardy 29 members did attend the midweek outing at the end of September during Alert Level Two. I think this clearly shows an appetite to continue fellowship and activity during these tough times, and I believe branch members are old enough and sensible enough to manage their personal safety. We will require all visitors to the clubrooms to use the QR codes on the front door, and/or record their name in our day book. Please bring face masks. We will have a short club run followed by a picnic on the Saturday planned originally for the replacement Sulphur City date, details elsewhere in this issue.

Speaking of Sulphur City, despite it being cancelled twice this year, we are hoping the planning and effort put in, including sponsor support, can carry through until we are able to run the event in 2022. We will also, lockdowns permitting, have our 10th anniversary Lakefront Car Show on Anniversary weekend next year, Sunday 30 January 2022. The parking for visitors has improved and we can promote the new boardwalk for visitors to have a look at.



August Car In The Room by Michael Thorne 1988 Panther Kallista (Greek = beautiful)

My Kallista was manufactured in June 1988 in Essex, UK and immediately shipped to NZ and first registered in Dec 1988.

Dr Green of Ashburton purchased the car in 1994 @ 5604mls. I purchased the car from Dr Green through Bains Motor House in May 2014 @ 17400 miles. I had it checked out and serviced, then flew to Christchurch and drove the car back to Rotorua. Its not the most practical of cars but I've had 7 years of fun. With no power steering, no ABS, no STC, discs on the front only and 50 year old technology its "seat of the pants" driving. Its peppy motor and a light weight body combine for quick performance. Just ask the Stag boys and Rocky's GT6 why they cant keep up with me.

Panther Car Company

Founded in 1972 by Bob Jankel, production was originally based in Essex but the production plant moved a few times. Panther produced a range of models including the J72 based on an XJ6 (Jaguar SS100 'look a like' but ugly) and the 3 axled Panther 6. They also produced a Lima, based on a Vauxhall 1.4L motor and running gear. In 1980 the company encountered financial trouble so was sold to Young C Kim (son of the family who owned the giant Jindo Industries of South Korea). Young Kim wanted to get into sports cars and with an unlimited budget ordered a successor to the Lima. Using a purpose built chassis the Kallista used Ford running gear and a 2.8L V6 or a 1.6L in-line 4. The design brief was to look like a Morgan. The car is listed as an aluminium body but steel doors and fibreglass guards were also used. Apparently it took seven men, three months to build a car. In 1987 Ssang Yong took over Jindo and in 1990 production was moved to Korea, where only 78 cars were produced using a 2.3L motor. In 1991 production was closed but kept a parts company in the UK. The parts company closed in 1995 and the stock was purchased by

Bruno Eismark, a long time employee of Panther and still operates today. The Panther Car Club is strong in the UK and Europe.

The NZ Connection

There are 4 x 2.8L and 2 x 1.6L Kallista's in NZ. In 1987 Bevan McNabb of Rutherford Motors, Nelson, imported 5 Kallista's into NZ. I saw a copy in a car magazine dated May 1989 which lists the Kallista @ \$55900. They didn't sell. Bevan kept one and the other 4 were shipped to Australia. I have just sold my Panther to Mark of Christchurch. The car was checked out before purchase by Mark's father Ken, who was the original Production Manager for Panther in the UK.

What a bonus Covid has been! For the last year Jen has only seen me at meal times and Blerta has slowly revealed herself to be not such an ugly duckling. Oh! there's still a long way to go to get her road ready but it's been a journey of discovery and so much pleasure and satisfaction. The cost... irrelevant.

With nearly 30 members pouring over her, there were bound to be some helpful hints. Bill and Geoff were very observant to see that the water pump pulley was out of alignment. Thanks guys!

While us blokes were discussing mechanical things, the girls were rolling their eyes and talking about gardening matters. Jen was grateful for tips received.
